Violence is a serious problem in the psychiatric inpatient care environment [].Violence towards staff affects their physical and psychological health and can result in stress, absenteeism, and resignations [2,3,4,5,6].In our previous study from 2018, 47% of staff members working in psychiatric inpatient care in Sweden experienced violence during the 6 months prior to the study [].

One major focus in forensic psychology and psychiatry over the past several decades has been the development of risk assessments to aid in the identification of those individuals most at risk of exhibiting violent behavior.

How can we reduce violence and aggression in psychiatric ...

This study combined staff and patient factors in a final model to examine the prediction of violence and aggression. The factors that increased the relative risk of violence included some recognized in earlier univariate research—a history of violence, involuntary admission, increased nursing staff, and planned absences by nonnursing staff (10 , 20 , 31).

1.2.11 Consider using an actuarial prediction instrument such as the BVC (Brøset Violence Checklist) or the DASA-IV (Dynamic Appraisal of Situational Aggression – Inpatient Version), rather than unstructured clinical judgement alone, to monitor and reduce incidents of violence and aggression and to help develop a risk management plan in inpatient psychiatric settings.

In the long-term management of aggressive behavior, ascertain whether the potential for violence can be managed with psychotherapy before proceeding with medications. It is important to convey empathy and authenticity: if the agitated patient feels that he is understood and a good therapeutic relationship is in process, he may be less suspicious and defensive.

Objective: Aggression is a significant clinical problem in psychiatric facilities. The present study reviews data on aggression collected from psychiatric inpatient units in order to determine prevalence and causal factors. Method: Data on aggressive incidents were gathered from four adult psychiatric units in the Illawarra, Australia.
